





Across the curriculum, children have embraced exciting topics—from exploring emotions and identity in EYFS to investigating World War II in Year 6. Our learning has been enriched through hands-on projects, thoughtful discussions, and meaningful cross-curricular links, including designing Anderson shelters, debating street art, and composing recycling rhymes.

This term has also been a celebration of pupil voice and leadership. We launched our new Eco Council, elected our School Council through democratic class votes, and welcomed Mohammed Ali, a renowned Birmingham-based street artist, who inspired Year 4 with a live demonstration and creative workshop. We were also honoured to host Tahir Ali MP, who spoke with our School Council about leadership, community, and civic responsibility—encouraging pupils to stay informed and engaged with the world around them.

Our enrichment offer continues to grow, with lunchtime and afterschool clubs in music, sport, cookery, computing, and more. Pupils have also enjoyed exciting trips, including a visit to Bewdley Museum and an Equality, Diversity and Inclusion workshop at Aston Villa's Brookvale Academy.

While our attendance currently stands at 93.4%, below our 96% target, we are grateful to the many families who continue to prioritise their child's education. Please take note of the reminders around term-time holidays and the support available through our Early Help offer.

Acorn Pupils: All About Me

It's been a wonderfully busy and heartwarming start to the year in The Woodland, Springfield's dedicated provision for pupils with SEND. Staff have welcomed several new children this half term, and it has been a joy to see them settle in, grow in confidence, and begin to thrive in their new environment. The theme for this half term has been All About Me, with children exploring their senses, body parts, and families through a rich variety of activities. Messy play, sensory exploration, songs, and stories have all played a central role in helping children connect with the topic in meaningful and engaging ways.

A particular highlight has been seeing both the Acorn and Oak Rooms learning side by side, sharing experiences and building a sense of community across the unit.

In the Acorn Room, the focus has been on helping pupils feel safe, happy, and confident as they adapt to new routines. Staff have created a nurturing environment where children can explore through play and develop key skills. Activities such as sensory stories, bucket time, and Fun with Food have supported the development of attention and communication. Children have especially enjoyed exploring different textures, joining in with familiar songs, and beginning to show early independence during snack time and tidy-up routines. These small but significant steps are helping to lay strong foundations

for learning and personal growth.



Oak Pupils: All About Me


In the Oak Room, children have been immersed in the All About Me topic through a wide range of hands-on and sensory-rich activities. The half term has been filled with opportunities to explore identity, develop key skills, and build confidence across the curriculum.

In English, pupils have enjoyed engaging with the story Funnybones, using sensory storytelling and colourful semantics to retell the tale and deepen their understanding of narrative structure. These approaches have supported language development and encouraged expressive communication.

In Maths, the children have been busy investigating sorting, measuring, and patterns through practical activities that promote early mathematical thinking. Science lessons have focused on the senses, with children exploring how we experience the world around us through touch, taste, smell, sight, and sound.

Topic sessions have encouraged children to reflect on what makes them special and unique, fostering self-awareness and celebrating diversity. In Art, this theme came to life through the creation of vibrant self-portraits, which now brighten the classroom walls.

Computing has introduced pupils to basic laptop skills, including typing and mouse control, helping to build digital confidence and independence. Life skills have also been a key focus, with















Acorn and Oak Pupils: Forest School

This half term, children have thoroughly enjoyed exploring the allotments and Forest School area as the season transitioned into autumn. With curiosity and enthusiasm, they observed the changing environment—spotting pumpkins, apples, and towering sunflowers growing in the allotment, and getting to know the resident chickens who have quickly become familiar friends.

The mud kitchen has been a hub of imaginative play, with children using pots, pans, and utensils to create all sorts of culinary delights from soil and leaves. Their fascination with nature has extended to investigating minibeasts around the site, encouraging close observation and gentle interaction with the natural world.

As part of the All About Me topic, children created beautiful self-portraits using natural materials such as twigs, leaves, and conkers—celebrating their individuality while connecting with the environment. They have also collected autumnal treasures, noticing the vibrant colours of fallen leaves and the textures of conkers, acorns, and seed pods.

Each Forest School session has ended with a comforting treat: a warm hot chocolate and a biscuit, shared around the fire circle—a lovely way to reflect on the day's adventures and build a sense of community.













Nursery: A Warm Welcome to Our Youngest Learners

This half term has marked a joyful beginning for our Nursery children as they embark on their learning journey at Springfield Primary Academy. Staff have been delighted to welcome both children and families to the start of a brand-new school year, and it has been heartening to see how quickly children are beginning to settle into their routines.



For many of our youngest pupils, this is their first experience of being away from home. While a few tears are to be expected, each day brings more smiles, growing confidence, and a deepening sense of belonging. The children are becoming increasingly comfortable in their new environment, exploring the space with curiosity and play-based learning with growing engaging independence.

Staff have already observed some lovely moments of sharing, helping, and early friendships forming—not only among the children but also between children and adults. These interactions are laying the foundations for a nurturing and inclusive learning community.

Lunchtimes have been a particular success, with children

These everyday routines are helping to build confidence and autonomy, and families are encouraged to support these skills at home too.

It's a truly exciting time of discovery, and staff are looking forward to working in close partnership with families to support each child's journey. Reception: Stories, Routines and Resilience






This half term, Reception children have enjoyed a wonderful selection of books including The Colour Monster Goes to School, Funnybones, and The Squirrels Who Squabbled. These engaging stories have helped children explore themes around emotions, family, and friendship, while also supporting their understanding of themselves and others. Staff have been impressed by the children's excellent listening skills and their ability to recall and retell stories in their own words—an essential foundation for future learning.



Alongside their literacy development, children have been learning the routines of school life and showing remarkable resilience. Coming in each day with growing confidence, they have worked incredibly hard and are beginning to take pride in their achievements. understand that many children are going home tired, which is a natural part of adjusting to the demands of school.

Families can continue to support their child's development by ensuring regular attendance, sharing books at home, and encouraging independence through everyday activities. Fine motor skills can be strengthened through playful tasks such as squeezing clothes pegs or tweezers, stretching elastic bands, squishing play dough, using scissors, and making marks with pencils or crayons.

















Year 1: Black History Month



This October, Springfield Primary Academy has been proudly celebrating Black History Month under the theme "Standing Firm in Power and Pride." Across the school, each class has been learning about an inspiring Black historical figure, with pupils producing thoughtful and creative work to contribute that celebrates identity,

a whole-school display resilience, and achievement.

Our values assemblies have supported this learning by highlighting incredible the contributions of the Black community, both past and present. Children have explored stories of courage, pride, and perseverance, and reflected on how we can all celebrate diversity and make a positive difference in our school and wider community.

The enthusiasm and creativity shown by pupils has been

outstanding, and we look forward to sharing their learning, artwork, and reflections in our floor books and around the school.



Year 1:Exploring the Seasons Through Science

Year 1 have had a fantastic start to the year, diving into the wonders of seasonal change through hands-on science learning. The children have been learning to identify the four seasons and describe how each one looks and feels, using observation and discussion to deepen their understanding.

They've explored how weather patterns shift throughout the day and investigated light and shadows—discovering how the position of a light source affects the size and shape of a shadow. These practical experiences have helped bring scientific concepts to life in an engaging and memorable way.

One of the highlights this term was creating rain gauges using recycled water bottles. This activity not only supported their understanding of rainfall and weather changes but also encouraged sustainability and creativity. The children have shown great curiosity and enthusiasm throughout, and staff are proud of the progress they've made already.













Year 2: Geography: You're In Europe




This half term, Year 2 have been developing their geographical knowledge exploring the continent of Europe. The children have discovered what Europe is and learned that it is made up of diverse over 50 countries. They were particularly fascinated

to learn that Russia is the largest country in Europe.

As part of their learning, pupils have been identifying both physical features—such as mountains, rivers, and coastlines and human features like cities, buildings, and landmarks. They have also explored the differences between urban and rural areas, gaining a deeper understanding of how people live in different parts of the continent.

Using maps and compass points, the children have practiced locating countries and describing their positions, building important spatial awareness and map-reading skills. The Year 2 team are proud of the children's enthusiasm and curiosity as



Year 2: Hiking Heroes at Warley Woods



As part of Springfield's 11b411 promise, Year 2 proudly fulfilled their Hiking Heroes pledge with a memorable trip to Warley Woods. The children had a fantastic time walking through woodland trails, enjoying the fresh air, autumn colours, and the peaceful surroundings.

During their adventure, pupils created imaginative 'nature wands' using sticks collected along the way, decorated with colourful yarn and vibrant autumn leaves. They challenged themselves by hiking up steep hills, showing great determination and teamwork.

After the hike, the children enjoyed running and playing with friends in the open grassy areas, making the most of the space and freedom. It was a joyful day filled with exploration, creativity, and physical activity—and a wonderful way to connect with nature while building resilience and confidence.














Year 3: Art Inspired by Patrick Caulfield




This half term, Year 3 pupils have been exploring the bold and distinctive artwork of British artist Patrick Caulfield, known for his striking use of colour, clean lines, and graphic style. The children began by studying some of Caulfield's most iconic pieces, observing how he combined everyday objects with flat areas of bright colour and strong outlines to create a sense of simplicity and drama.

Through class discussions and sketchbook work, pupils learned how Caulfield's art sits between realism and abstraction, and how he used shape and composition to guide the viewer's eye. Inspired by his techniques, the children then embarked on creating their own prints, experimenting with a range of materials and styles.



One of the highlights was foil printing. Pupils carefully applied paint to sheets of foil and used blunt tools—

such as brush ends, sticks, or pencils—to draw patterns and shapes into the wet paint. This process revealed areas of negative space, and when paper was pressed onto the foil, it lifted a vibrant, textured image. The results were striking and showcased the children's creativity and growing understanding of artistic processes.




The results captured both the boldness of Patrick Caulfield's style and the students' own creativity, with each print showing a unique combination of colour, texture, and expressive mark-making. The class also tried collagraphy, building up textured printing plates with layers of card, fabric, and string to create rich surfaces that echoed Caulfield's sense of contrast and depth. Each child developed a unique print that combined bright, flat colour with textured details, celebrating





Throughout the project, pupils developed their skills in composition, texture, and colour theory, while also building confidence in experimenting with new artistic processes. The final prints will showcase their growing understanding of how artists like Caulfield transform simple imagery into powerful visual statements — and how they, too, can express ideas through line,



















Year 4 - Street Art and Creative Expression



This term, Year 4 have been exploring the vibrant world of street art, with a special focus on Birmingham-based artist Mohammed Ali. The children began by examining different styles of street art and engaging in thoughtful discussions around the question: What makes something art? They explored how artists use imagery to communicate feelings, ideas, and powerful messages.

Inspired by these discussions, pupils practiced creating colourful backgrounds and experimented with stencils to design their own artwork. They chose themes and messages that were personally meaningful, exploring different writing styles and symbolic imagery to create expressive and impactful pieces.

A highlight of the term was welcoming Mohammed Ali into school on 10th October. He began with a live demonstration for Key Stage 2, showcasing how street art is created, before leading a hands-on workshop with Year 4. During the session, pupils worked alongside him to develop meaningful messages through art, gaining insight into his creative process.
















Year 5: Scientific Thinking and Settling In

Year 5 have made a fantastic start to the new academic year, settling in confidently and showing great enthusiasm across all areas of learning. Staff have been particularly impressed by the children's curiosity, independence, and thoughtful contributions during lessons. The classes have quickly adapted to new routines and expectations, and their positive attitude has created a focused and supportive learning environment.

Science has been a real highlight this half term, with pupils diving into the topic Properties and Changes of Materials. They have explored a wide range of materials, investigating properties such as hardness, transparency, flexibility, and magnetism. Through

hands-on experiments, children have tested thermal insulators and electrical conductors, and explored solubility by observing how different substances behave when mixed with water.

In one memorable lesson, pupils investigated which materials are soluble and insoluble using everyday items such as sand, coffee granules, salt, flour, chalk, and rice. They made predictions, carried out fair tests, and recorded their observations—developing key scientific skills such as enquiry, analysis, and reasoning. These practical activities helped bring abstract concepts to life and encouraged children to think like scientists.



Beyond science, pupils have been working hard to build strong learning habits, collaborate effectively with peers, and take increasing responsibility for their own progress.







Properties and Changes in Materials













Year 6: Life in Wartime Britain

This half term, Year 6 immersed have themselves fascinating and thought -provoking study World War II, exploring the historical events, personal stories, and practical challenges faced by those living in Britain during wartime. The topic has sparked



curiosity, empathy, and creativity across the curriculum, with meaningful connections made between history, design technology, literacy, and drama.

In history, pupils began by mapping out the key events of the Second World War, building a timeline to understand how the

conflict unfolded across Europe and beyond. They then zoomed in on life in Britain during the war, examining the experiences of evacuees, the impact of rationing, and the realities of air raids. Children explored how families adapted to these challenges, and how bomb shelters played a vital role in keeping people safe.




The study has also included sensitive and respectful engagement with the Holocaust, helping children understand the importance of remembrance, human rights, and standing up against injustice. Through discussion, drama, and source analysis, pupils have developed a deeper understanding of the resilience and resourcefulness shown by ordinary people during extraordinary times.

In Design Technology, the children have linked their historical learning to practical skills by designing and constructing Anderson shelters, applying their knowledge of materials and structures to create models that reflect the ingenuity of wartime Britain. This hands-on project has allowed pupils to

think critically and creatively while deepening their understanding of the

The Year 6 team have been incredibly proud of the maturity, empathy, and enthusiasm shown by the children throughout this topic. It has been a powerful start to the year, laying the groundwork for thoughtful learning and meaningful reflection.



Year 6: Building Anderson Shelters

Building on their history learning about World War II, Year 6 pupils have channeled their understanding into a hands-on Design Technology project focused on strong and structures. Inspired by the Anderson shelters used during the Blitz, the children have designed and constructed their own miniature models using card, paper, and recycled materials.



Throughout the unit, pupils investigated how to reinforce materials to improve strength and durability. They explored techniques such as laminating (layering materials for added strength), folding (to create structural rigidity), and ribbing (adding ridges or supports) to ensure their shelters could withstand pressure and remain stable.

The design process involved planning, testing, and refining ideas—encouraging creativity, resilience, and problem-solving. Pupils worked collaboratively, sharing strategies and evaluating the effectiveness of different approaches. The final shelters showcase not only their engineering thinking but also their teamwork and attention to detail.

This project has been a brilliant example of cross-curricular learning, where historical understanding has informed practical design, and pupils have gained valuable insight into how people in wartime Britain used resourcefulness and innovation to stay safe

To bring their World War II learning to life, Year 6 embarked

Year 6: Bewdley Museum

To bring their World War II learning to life Year 6 pupils embarked on a memorable trip to Bewdley Museum, where they experienced a hands-on glimpse into life on the home front. Greeted by a Billeting Officer and a Land Girl, the children stepped into the shoes of evacuees and explored what daily life was like for families during the 1940s.

The immersive experience included trying on gas masks, examining authentic wartime artefacts, and venturing inside a genuine bomb shelter—an opportunity that sparked



thoughtful reflection and curiosity. One of the most powerful moments was learning about the Blackout, and how it affected families across Britain. Pupils were struck by the challenges of living without light at night and the importance of community resilience during times of uncertainty.















Early Help - Supporting Our Families




Enrichment Activities


Recycle Week 2025 – A Whole-School Celebration of Sustainability



Top tips:

- ⇒ Use child friendly versions of apps. Google Safe Search, YouTube Kids and the child filters on streaming sites are all easily accessible and designed with young children in mind.
- ⇒ Encourage your children to watch longer form, calmer shows on the internet. YouTube shorts, TikTok's and Instagram reels are short, high-content and not designed for young children to watch and process.
- ⇒ Watch things online together. Being online can be part of your evening routines, especially if you make it family activity. This will build a healthier relationship with the internet and allow your children to show and discuss what they are watching.
- ⇒ Have dedicated "Internet time" or "screen time" to help your child have a better relationship and build interests outside of devices.
- ⇒ If you're concerned with how much time your child is spending online, model a great example children copy what they see.
- ⇒ Contact your Internet Service Provider to ask about child safety blocks and other tips. Likewise, your phone network provider can help with securing apps on your phone and tablet.















Attendance Matters

Spotlight on Term-Time Holidays

In Birmingham, taking a child on an unauthorised term-time holiday can result in a fixed penalty notice of £80 per parent, per child, rising to £160 if not paid within 21 days. A second notice within three years incurs a £160 fine with no discount, and further unauthorised absences may lead to prosecution and fines of up to £2,500.

Since the start of the 2025/26 school year, 19 families at Springfield have received fixed penalty notices. Please continue working with us to ensure your child attends school every day—every lesson counts.
